



Thanksgiving, Thursday, November 26, 2020. Will I finally have the opportunity to be with my family that I haven't seen since February? Will I be able to hug them? Will be able to find all of the ingredients for our traditional Thanksgiving meal, one that hasn't changed since my childhood? (Oops, those were not the questions that I was supposed to be thinking about but, in this time of social isolation, that can happen to an individual.)

Having said that, let's get back to the topic that I meant to address. Do you know the meaning of the Greek word "Eucharist?" It means "thanksgiving." We have just begun the Year of the Eucharist, a year of thanksgiving in the Seattle Archdiocese, a year meant for study and reflection on the meaning of the Eucharist in our lives and thankfulness for the sacrament. We are thankful because we believe that we are consuming the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are thankful because we know that this meal, this feast freely offered gives us food for the journey that we call life.

But, there is more to the Eucharist than food for the journey. As Archbishop Etienne said in his homily on Corpus Christi and again in his pastoral letter, "...but the Eucharist provides us with a significant spirituality of how to live everyday more like Jesus.

Of course as the Archbishop says, the Eucharist is central to the work of redemption, but it is more than that. Paraphrasing from I Corinthians, not only do we receive the Body and Blood of Christ, we participate in it. Eucharist does not end when mass is over. We continue to participate in the Eucharist during our everyday lives. In fact, I would go so far as to suggest that our participation begins fully when we step outside the doors of the church.

The Eucharist gives us the grace to live more like Jesus and another word for being able to live more like Jesus is STEW-ARDSHIP--the Stewardship of Time Talent and Treasure. Our life can be a life lived knowing that we are beloved daughters and sons of God . All that we have, all that we are is gift. Having received these gifts, including the gift of Eucharist, we should with great thanksgiving share our gifts with others in any way that we can.


#### **Disaster Relief Collection**

The USCCB has asked Archbishop Etienne to take up a special collection as a result of the devastating impact of Hurricane Laura, devastating wildfires, and other disasters.

Most Reverend Jose H. Gomez, President of United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and accompanying letter from Most Reverend Glen John Provost, Bishop of Lake Charles, Louisiana explain more about this special appeal in their letters, which we have made available for you by clicking here. Here is a brief excerpt of note:

"The funds collected in this special appeal will become part of the Bishops Emergency Disaster Fund and will be used to support the efforts of Catholic Charities USA and/or Catholic Relief Services, the official relief agencies of the U.S. Catholic Church, as they and their local agencies respond to immediate emergency needs for such necessities as water, food, shelter, and medical care and aid in long-term rebuilding and recovery efforts; and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops for pastoral and reconstruction needs of the Church is critical. Funds will be used in response to Hurricane Laura and any other disasters that occur and will be distributed where they are most needed."

Envelopes for this special collection will be available this weekend near the collection boxes.



106th Annual World of Migrants & Refugees -

#### September 27th:

Climate change is the leading cause of displacement among people globally. In 2019, **75%** of all displaced people, or **24.9 million** individuals were displaced for environmental reasons. **13 million** were displaced by storms, **11.9 million** by hurricanes and typhoons, **10 million** by floods, and **947,000** by geophysical events such as earthquakes, tsunamis, and volcanic eruptions.

## Creation Care Corner

#### WEEKLY STEWARDSHIP RECOMMENDATION:

Reducing air travel can dramatically reduce your household carbon emissions. Air travel accounts for 12% of all U.S. transportation greenhouse gas emissions that warm the planet. Driving may be a better environmental option on shorter trips (300-500 miles). Driving high mileage cars with additional passengers is almost always a better environmental option. When flying, non-stop coach flights are the best alternative. If you must fly, consider purchasing carbon offsets from a reputable company like United Airlines, who works through Conservation International https://united.conservation.org. Purchasing offsets takes planet-warming carbon dioxide out of the atmosphere in exchange for the greenhouse gases that are contributed via your air travel.



We are called to live our faith in all aspects of our lives. This provoking question requires much prayer and discernment from each of us. We acknowledge the difficulty of this question and the perceived alignment or misalignment of the candidates and issues with our Catholic faith. Our Church teaches a consistent ethic of life so we are called to be advocates for a variety of issues related to life and human dignity. Some have misinterpreted this teaching to convey that each related issue is morally equivalent. This is not the case. Some have misinterpreted this teaching to convey that one related issue could excuse indifference to the rest: this is not the case either. We have challenging work ahead of us! Starting this week, we will be highlighting each of the seven principles of Catholic Social Teaching to aid the discerning vote. We will not be telling you for whom or what to vote. We will be encouraging careful discernment, intentional prayer, and a universal call to holiness and compassion to inform your voting.

During this first week, we focus on the call to Family, Community and Participation. Our God is Trinity, three persons, one God. These three persons are in constant relationship with each other. Being created in the image of God, we too need to be in relationships. Each human person is not only sacred but also social. We must recognize and cherish the gift of belonging to our immediate family and wider family; the Church and society. The Church teaches that in order to fully belong to a family and community, participation is essential. We encourage you to ensure you and your family are registered to vote. Get informed and educated about the candidates and issues on the ballot. Our community calls us to participate not just for our own needs but for the larger whole of society. Voting is an actionable way to love and a tool to cultivate community.
