FROM YOUR PASTOR



The Latin Tridentine Mass Following the Second Vatican Council's reform of the Mass and the use of the vernacular language, the Church allowed restricted use of the former Tridentine ritual for those who found it painfully difficult to accept the new ritual. That use was expanded by Pope John Paul II and even

further by Pope Benedict XVI who allowed any priest to celebrate the Tridentine Mass. The intent was to bring back into unity those who left the Church following the Council. Pope Francis has recently restricted the use of the Tridentine ritual. He states: "In defense of the unity of the Body of Christ, I am constrained to revoke the faculty granted by my Predecessors. The distorted use that has been made of this faculty is contrary to the intentions that led to granting the freedom to celebrate the Mass with the Missale Romanum of 1962." Pope Francis indicates his vision that people presently celebrating Mass with the Roman Missal of 1962 need to return in due time to the Roman Rite promulgated by Saints Paul VI and John Paul II.

Now, only the diocesan bishop may grant permission to use the Tridentine Mass in certain conditions. Archbishop Etienne is allowing two places to continue using this Latin Mass: the North American Martyrs parish in Edmonds, and Saint Joseph Parish in Tacoma. Only the priests of the Priestly Fraternity of Saint Peter are entrusted with these celebrations. "Priests living and/or ministering in the Archdiocese of Seattle are not authorized either to begin or to continue enjoying the faculty to celebrate Mass according to the Roman Missal of 1962."

I never knew enough Latin even to attempt such a celebration. Nor could I embrace the ecclesiology behind the Tridentine ritual. I was around six years old when the liturgy was reformed and have only vague memories of the Tridentine ritual. I grew up with the new liturgy and its emphasis on full, conscious and active participation of all the faithful.

The Archbishop's goal is that "the People of God of the Archdiocese of Seattle will diligently strive for the unity expressed in the Eucharistic celebration by continuing to give proper attention to the faithful and dignified celebration of the Mass according to the Roman Rite promulgated by Saints Paul VI and John Paul II."

St. John the Baptist Parish has made its own sacrifice for this unity. You had a history of standing for the Eucharistic Prayer and for the Communion Procession (as did my former parish for the Communion Procession). I know it has been difficult for some to get use to the posture of kneeling at various times in the liturgy. Yet, we do it for the sake of unity throughout the archdiocese. Of course, those who are not physically able to kneel should remain seated. It's a joy to celebrate Mass with you and I look forward to the time we emerge from Covid and can sing and even more "give proper attention to the faithful and dignified celebration of the Mass according to the Roman Rite promulgated by Saints Paul VI and John Paul II."



STEWARDSHIP



We are blessed in our parish to have both a lay woman and man, who are certified spiritual directors. We shared Gigi Eakin's article a few weeks ago and we are grateful for David Richardson and the gifts he has shared with our parish for several years.

WHAT IS SPIRITUAL DIRECTION?

That was my question in 1999 ... what follows is my journey to finding the answer. I read an article which discussed a Program for training applicants in the Ministry of Spiritual Direction. Not exactly sure what all this entailed I spoke with our Pastor, Fr. Jack Wamseley about this ministry. We decided that the best way to better understand Spiritual Direction was to first experience it. So, for the next 3 years he served as my Spiritual Director. I found this experience to be very helpful toward understanding myself and my life experiences. Having a few years of this experience as a directee, and with our Pastor's encouragement, I entered a program to be trained as a Spiritual Director which I completed in 2004.

Spiritual Direction is sometimes called spiritual guidance or spiritual companionship. Spiritual direction is an on-going relationship in which a person desirous of being attentive to his or her spiritual journey regularly meets with a spiritual director (usually once a month) for the purpose of becoming more attuned to the presence of God's Spirit in all of life. It encourages one to explore a closer relationship with God. Spiritual direction aids a person in deepening their reflection on the experiences in their daily life. It's important to note that spiritual direction is really not about being "directed", rather, it is a shared journey in which the sign-posts along the way are examined together.

A spiritual director is someone who, with you, pays attention to your interior life, who cares about your deeper self, who helps you interpret your ongoing experiences and learn the art of discernment (the knack of knowing which inner voices to trust and, which to greet with suspicion), and who listens, encourages and challenges you. Spiritual directors continue to tend their own spiritual life by engaging in ongoing education, participating in confidential supervision with other spiritual directors, and meeting with one's own spiritual director. A spiritual directors' training focuses on many topics as they apply to this ministry which includes: studying the art of listening, scripture, lives of the saints, basic concepts of depth psychology & transformation, prayer, discernment, the practice & models of spiritual direction, the stages of spiritual growth & obstacles to spiritual growth, the use of personality tools, dream work, inner healing, life cycle concepts, loss & grief, spiritual warfare and the New Age movement, among other topics.

Over the past 18 years I've been very blessed with the many directees I've worked with and have found my own spiritual journey enriched in the process. I personally work out of the Ignatian Spirituality Center located on the campus of St. Joseph Parish in Seattle. A part of the service of any of the Spirituality Centers is to interview the inquiring directee candidate to ensure a compatible and well-suited match with a Spiritual director registered with their Center. In the first meeting both director and directee have the opportunity to get to know each other, background, etc. to confirm the fit is comfortable. Together they establish a time to meet and the frequency. Periodically, they will assess the fruitfulness of their meetings and as their journey unfolds on some occasions, the two will conclude their journeying together and another Spiritual Director may be engaged at the choosing of the directee.





The Season of Creation: *September 1 – October 4*

The Season of Creation spans five weeks between the **World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation** (September 1) and the **Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi** (October 4). This "time for creation" offers, in the words of Pope Francis, "individual believers and communities a fitting opportunity to reaffirm their personal vocation to be stewards of creation, to thank God for the wonderful handiwork which he has entrusted to our care, and to implore his help for the protection of creation as well as his pardon for the sins committed against the world in which we live."¹ Below are some ways to live out these three dimensions of Pope Francis' call, both as individuals and as a community.

1. Reaffirm Our Vocation as Stewards of Creation

As individuals and families: *Counteract the "Throwaway Culture"*

In *Laudato Si'*, Pope Francis brings attention to our "throwaway culture," which "quickly reduces things to rubbish" (no. 22). In your daily life, try to identify the ways in which you can choose reusables, rather than disposables, such as coffee mugs, reusable bags, or cloth napkins, and commit to making one change during this month.

As a community: *Educational Program*

Use the educational program "Befriend the Wolf" from the Catholic Climate Covenant to reflect on our vocation as stewards of creation. The program is designed to help your community contemplate the connections between all creatures under God our Creator. Visit bit.ly/CCC-BTF to access this resource.



2. Thank God for His Wonderful Handiwork



As individuals and families: *Meal Prayer*

Before and after meals, say a short prayer of thanksgiving for the lifegiving food that sustains and nourishes us. Briefly consider how all nourishment ultimately comes from the earth, and give thanks for all the human hands that helped bring this food to your table. May we recognize, as *Laudato Si'* has

taught us, that this "moment of blessing, however brief, reminds us of our dependence on God for life" (no. 227).

Here are a few suggestions from the Diocese of Stockton, California on how to care for creation:

- Buy Fair Trade products to support local artisans and farmers and protect the environment.
- Store food in reusable containers, not plastic wrap or foil, to reduce waste.
- Avoid using Styrofoam at your parish functions. Styrofoam can rarely be recycled, and it takes 500 years to decompose in landfills!

As a community: *Eucharistic Adoration*

One of the most meaningful ways we give thanks as Christians is through the sacrament of the Eucharist, a word which means "thanksgiving." As *Laudato Si'* proclaims, through the Eucharist, "the whole cosmos gives thanks to God" (no. 236). To celebrate this sacred reality during the Season of Creation, we recommend hosting a one-hour, care for creation-themed eucharistic adoration in your parish. 3. Implore God's Help and Ask His Pardon

As individuals and families: *Confession*

In calling for a deep "ecological conversion," Pope Francis has emphasized the importance of examining one's own conscience, of recognizing one's sins against creation, however great or small. Seeing the interconnectedness of our world leads to an understanding that "[e]very violation of solidarity and civic friendship harms the environment" (*Caritas in Veritate*, no. 51). We invite you to bring these sins to confession and to perform a spiritual work of mercy for our common home, such as an act of "grateful contemplation of God's world" (*Laudato Si'*, no. 214).



As a community: *Prayer Service*

One final suggestion for this time is to organize a prayer service in your parish. The Catholic Climate Covenant has developed a four-part prayer service to be said after Mass each week. As we approach the beautiful autumn season, holding this service outside may allow for a rich experience. Please visit bit.ly/CCC-PS to access this resource.

We all depend on workers in America's meat-processing plants and animal-feeding operations, who are essential to the food supply chain. Many of them are immigrants facing language barriers that leave them at a disadvantage when they advocate for safe working conditions, just wages, and fair treatment from employers. The Rural Community Workers Alliance (RCWA) in Missouri helps these essential workers by advocating on their behalf for safe working conditions and by promoting gatherings to address racial divisions in the community as a way to help immigrants and nonimmigrants discover similarities and share their experiences.


The COVID-19 pandemic revealed working conditions at a pork-processing plant that placed workers at risk of infection due to shoulder-to-shoulder work areas and a lack of protective gear. Workers brought their concerns to RCWA and ultimately filed a lawsuit demanding that the company follow health and safety guidelines established by the federal government. Even before the court ruled

on the lawsuit, the company took action to protect workers by installing protective barriers, sanitizing stations, providing masks, and conducting temperature checks. When you support CCHD's mission of working on the margins, you help groups such as RCWA advocate for the health and safety of the essential workers that we all depend upon.

Todos nosotros dependemos de los trabajadores de las plantas procesadoras de carne y de los procesos de alimentación de animales en los Estados Unidos, lo cual es esencial para la cadena de suministro de alimentos. Muchos de ellos son inmigrantes que enfrentan barreras idiomáticas que los ponen en desventaja cuando abogan por condiciones laborales seguras, por salarios justos y por un trato equitativo de parte de sus empleadores. La Alianza de Trabajadores de la Comunidad Rural, en inglés *Rural Community Workers Alliance (RCWA)*, en Missouri, ayuda a estos trabajadores esenciales abogando, a nombre de ellos, por unas condiciones laborales seguras y fomentando reuniones para abordar las divisiones raciales en la comunidad a fin de ayudar a los inmigrantes y no-inmigrantes a descubrir lo que tienen en común y a compartir sus experiencias.

La pandemia del COVID-19 puso al descubierto unas condiciones laborales en una planta procesadora de carne de cerdo que ponía a los trabajadores en riesgo de infección debido a laborar hombro con hombro en las zonas de trabajo y a la falta de un equipo de protección. Los trabajadores presentaron su preocupación a RCWA y, al final, presentaron una demanda exigiendo que la empresa cumpla con las normas de salud y seguridad establecidas

por el gobierno federal. Incluso antes de que el tribunal dictaminara sobre la demanda, la empresa tomó medidas para proteger a los trabajadores instalando barreras protectoras, desinfectando estaciones, proporcionando mascarillas y realizando controles de temperatura. Cuando ustedes apoyan la misión de CCHD de trabajar desde la periferia, ustedes ayudan a grupos como RCWA a abogar por la salud y la seguridad de esos trabajadores esenciales de los cuales todos dependemos.
