Question: What does this mean for schools?

Answer: Schools are a vital ministry of a parish, and they will benefit from stronger parish families through Partners in the Gospel. In the near term, there will be no changes for Catholic schools. Parishes will be placed in a new parish family in 2024, and then the parish family will have three years to determine how it would like to join together. This planning process will include discernment around all ministries, including Catholic schools.

These leaders may draw upon the Partners in the Gospel resources and tools, as well as the support of the parish liaison.

Watch for Our New "Reserved" Chair Markers

It is sometimes hard for the Eucharistic Ministers to find the people who want communion brought to them during Mass. Thanks to members of the Life, Justice, and Peace Commission, who came up with the idea to add chair covers to help the Eucharistic Ministers spot them more easily, we now have yellow-gold chair markers. If you would like communion brought to you, just ask a greeter or the Point Person before Mass to give you a yellow-gold chair cover. Place these covers over your chair back with **the triangle facing towards the aisle**, so it can be spotted easily. They should look like this:



It would also help the Eucharistic Ministers have easier access if the person who needs communion brought to them would sit at the seat closest to the aisle. Thank you for your cooperation.

Pastoral Care also is a ministry of presence. Simply being present and listening to those who cannot attend Mass is a powerful ministry. At St. John's we have ministers who take communion to the sick and homebound, and those who visit, listen, and pray with them in the form of words and music.

Right now, we have a critical need for more pastoral care ministers. Our community is aging and many more people have requested communion than we have ministers to take it to them.
