Let any staff person or me know if you would like to explore a ministry in the parish.






Question: Are other dioceses doing this?

Using these insights, our archdiocesan team developed a planning and consultation model that reflects the uniqueness of the Archdiocese of Seattle. Our model is more consultative, embraces our cultural diversity and history, and reflects our large geography that includes concentrated city centers as well as suburban and rural communities.

While we appreciate the guidance and insights from other dioceses, success in the Archdiocese of Seattle will come from the creativity and collaboration of each parish family, led by the Holy Spirit. .

Watch for Our New "Reserved" Chair Markers

It is sometimes hard for the Eucharistic Ministers to find the people who want communion brought to them during Mass. Thanks to members of the Life, Justice, and Peace Commission, who came up with the idea to add chair covers to help the Eucharistic Ministers spot them more easily, we now have yellow-gold chair markers. If you would like Holy Communion brought to you, just ask a greeter or the Point Person before Mass to give you a yellow-gold chair cover.

Place these covers over your chair back with **the triangle facing towards the aisle**, so it can be spotted easily. They should look like this:



It would also help the Eucharistic Ministers have easier access if the person who needs Holy Communion brought to them would sit at the seat closest to the aisle. Thank you for your cooperation.


Take Me Out to the Ballgame

Extending a Hand

We have had a few people ask whether it's okay to shake hands for the sign of peace at Mass. All COVID restrictions have been lifted, so it's perfectly fine to shake hands. However, we need to respect people and where they are in this journey out of the pandemic. Some may not yet feel comfortable with hand shaking.

If you would prefer not to shake hands, put your hands together and nod your greeting of peace to others. If you extend your hand to someone who isn't comfortable with handshaking, please do not take it personally if they don't take your hand. They may be protecting an immune-compromised loved one, for example.

We have also been asked about holding hands during the Our Father. Again, we need to respect where people are post-COVID. While the tradition in this parish during pre-COVID times has been to hold hands during the Our Father, it is not in the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, and is, therefore, not encouraged.



You might wish to consider extending your arms out in the *orans* posture like the priest. Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, the future Pope Benedict XVI, in his book, *The Spirit of the Liturgy*, described this posture as "the oldest

gesture of prayer in Christendom. It is a gesture of seeking and hoping. Man [sic] reaches out to the hidden God, stretches out toward him. Arms extended have been compared to wings: man [sic] seeks the heights, he wants to be, as it were, carried upward by God on the wings of prayer."
