Pastor's Corner

What Do We Do In the Absence of a Priest?



I would not mind being compared to Pope Francis. I am going to have the same surgery he had. Next week I will have minor surgery for a hernia repair. It is day surgery, but I will be home at least one week for recovery. Fr. Jim will cover the weekend Masses for us.

My recovery time is a good occasion to remind all what we do in absence of a priest. The two main areas of concern center on the Sunday Gathering for Eucharist and for people who are dying. If we were not able to find a priest to help, we do have people trained to

lead a Liturgy of the Word with the distribution of Communion in place of the Mass. If the situation was not planned for, we may not have sufficient number of consecrated hosts in the tabernacle. We would need to request a neighboring parish to consecrate additional hosts for us or simply have a Liturgy of the Word.

When a person is near death, the Church has a beautiful ritual called, "The Commendation of the Dying." This may be led by a priest, deacon, or layperson. If a priest is not available, we will have trained staff members and parishioners who can be with be with families at this difficult but holy moment.

The Anointing of the Sick, which requires a priest, is that prayer which we pray for healing and recovery from serious illness.

The term, "Last Rites," has not been in official use for the past 60 years, since the reforms of the Second Vatican Council. The closest thing to a last rite would be the Commendation of the Dying or the reception of Holy Communion by the one going home to God. Neither of these require a priest. As a priest, it is always a privilege to be with people at these moments, and they are a priority.

With PARTNERS IN THE GOSPEL, maybe a priest will be able to focus more on pastoral ministry. With fewer priests, there may be more occasions for the laity to be the presence of the Church for one another.

What do we do in the absence of a priest? We continue being Church.

Our Funeral Committee Needs Volunteers

If you have experienced the loss of a loved one and have had their funeral at St. John the Baptist (SJTB) in the times before and after COVID, chances are that you have experienced the amazing love, care, and food provided by the Funeral Reception Committee headed by Kathy Faille. This has been a part of the SJTB ethos of care in our gatherings since nearly the beginning. Families have appreciated the tremendous community support that a reception represents at a difficult time in their lives.

Typically 6-12 parishioners set up the room, prepare the food, and help with clean up. Unfortunately, the team is short-handed, as age and illness reduce the ranks. If the team cannot fill its roster, it will not be able to host receptions for SJTB funerals. **Currently, the ministry is on hiatus until we can find more volunteers.** We need men and women who can work on their feet for at least 4, and up to 6 hours, on the occasional Thursday or Friday (up to three times per month).

Watch for Our New "Reserved" Chair Markers

It is sometimes hard for the Eucharistic Ministers to find the people who want communion brought to them during Mass. Thanks to members of the Life, Justice, and Peace Commission, who came up with the idea to add chair covers to help the Eucharistic Ministers spot them more easily, we now have yellow-gold chair markers. If you would like communion brought to you, just ask a greeter or the Point Person before Mass to give you a yellow-gold chair cover. Place these covers over your chair back with **the triangle facing towards the aisle**, so it can be spotted easily. They should look like this:



It would also help the Eucharistic Ministers have easier access if the person who needs communion brought to them would sit at the seat closest to the aisle. Thank you for your cooperation.


Take Me Out to the Ballgame

Extending a Hand

We have had a few people ask whether it's okay to shake hands for the sign of peace at Mass. All COVID restrictions have been lifted, so it's perfectly fine to shake hands. However, we need to respect people and where they are in this journey out of the pandemic. Some may not yet feel comfortable with hand shaking.

If you would prefer not to shake hands, put your hands together and nod your greeting of peace to others. If you extend your hand to someone who isn't comfortable with handshaking, please do not take it personally if they don't take your hand. They may be protecting an immune-compromised loved one, for example.

We have also been asked about holding hands during the Our Father. Again, we need to respect where people are post-COVID. While the tradition in this parish during pre-COVID times has been to hold hands during the Our Father. It is not in the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, and is, therefore, not encouraged.



You might wish to consider extending your arms out in the orans posture like the priest. Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, the future Pope Benedict XVI, in his book, The Spirit of the Liturgy, described this posture as "the oldest gesture of prayer in Christendom. It is a

gesture of seeking and hoping. Man [sic] reaches out to the hidden God, stretches out toward him. Arms extended have been compared to wings: man [sic] seeks the heights, he wants to be, as it were, carried upward by God on the wings of prayer."
