

Father Bill is on a week-long retreat. Below is an article that was published in February 2023. The subject of anointing of the sick is an ongoing subject of discussion and merits repeating.

When We Are Called Home

Recently, people have been asking about the "Last Rites." This term has not been used for the past 60 years. The Second Vatican Council, in its reform of the liturgy, restored *Extreme Unction* (the *Last Anointing*) to its more ancient practice of being not just for the dying, but for the sick. Now known as the *Anointing of the Sick*, this sacrament prays for healing of body and soul. It is celebrated with those who are seriously ill, anticipating surgery, or suffering from advancing age.

The Church has a special care for those who are dying. There are two prayers for the dying. The first is called *Viaticum*, which translates "for the journey." It is sharing Holy Communion with the dying and focuses on the gift of Eucharist as the promise of eternal life. "Jesus said, 'The one who eats my body and drinks my blood will live forever." (Jn 6:54) *Viaticum* often includes a renewal of one's baptismal promises that began the journey of faith, now that the journey is reaching its conclusion.

The other prayer for the dying is called the *Commendation of the Dying*. It is a beautiful prayer that includes the litany of the saints and entrusts the dying into the gentle embrace of God. In one sense, it is the sending forth of the Christian soul from this life to eternity. Not only a comfort to the person dying, this prayer can have great meaning for family and friends who have gathered.

The Anointing of the Sick is led by a bishop or priest. Viaticum and the Commendation of the Dying can be led by a priest, deacon, or even a layperson. With fewer priests possibly covering larger areas, lay people may be called upon more and more to pray with the dying and accompanying them on this journey of faith. Though often difficult, it is a very holy experience.

A Reminder for all NEW Volunteers

St. John the Baptist (SJTB) is committed to a safe environment for our children, youth, and vulnerable adults.

If you are new to volunteering in any capacity here at SJTB, please **register with** *Virtus Online* **within 30 days of volunteering** at <u>virtusonline.org</u>. This is a program that provides training on how to keep our vulnerable communities safe. It also does background checks.

If you are already registered with *Virtus Online* and have completed the certification process, you are good for three years while in active service. You will get a reminder email when your next cycle will need to be renewed.

For people without access to minors or vulnerable adults but with access to cash, checks, or other negotiables, a background check must be completed on or before the first day of service and every three years while in active service. This requirement is also in effect for those volunteers who drive on behalf of the parish.

Partners in the Gospel Update

On November 16, 2023, the archdiocese released a letter from Archbishop Etienne and a Parish Feedback Report which synthesizes more than 3,000 pages of feedback from over 700 input session reports and 800 online forms during the Public Input Phase this fall. A review of the feedback was made by the Presbyteral Council, Priest Personnel Board, Oversight Committee, Partners Core team and Archbishop Etienne. As a result, proposed changes emerged for 25 parish families. There was a second round of consultation with staff and parishioners with these 25 proposed parish families. Archbishop Etienne is now in the final stages of discernment, and the final **list of parish families will be released on February 3, 2024**.
