Reception of Holy Communion



In celebrating the Mass, some things are determined by the Vatican, some by the conference of bishops for each nation, some by the local bishop, and a few by the pastor of a parish. How we receive Holy Communion is determined by each national conference of Catholic bishops. This may make it a bit confusing since our parish is made up of people from around the world. How you receive Communion in the nation of your birth may not be the custom here.

In the United States the posture for receiving Communion is standing. Those who kneel for communion are not to be refused, but they are to be instructed on the proper way to receive Communion. As you come forward for Holy Communion, one is to slightly bow one's head in reverence to the Eucharist. Note that there is no genuflection, just a bow of one's head.

Communion may be received either on the hand or on the tongue. If receiving on the tongue, you must do more than just open your mouth. You must stick out your tongue as well as open your mouth. (Yes, there seems to be a growing problem with this.) If receiving on the hand, hold one palm on top of the other. The Eucharist is never taken; it is always received. Therefore, let the Eucharistic Minister place the host on your tongue or on your hand.

Before receiving Communion, the Eucharistic Minister will proclaim, "The Body of Christ" or "The Blood of Christ." The one receiving Communion is to answer, "Amen." Be sure to answer loud enough for the Minister to hear you. This is your statement of faith that you believe the bread and wine are indeed the full presence of Christ and that you, yourself, are indeed a member of the Body of Christ on earth. As St. Augustine said, "We become what we eat."

Consume the Eucharist immediately upon receiving it.

The reception of communion is not the moment for personal expressions of piety, which can distract others and draw attention to ourselves. Rather, reverent in our belief in the Lord's true presence in the Eucharist, this is the time when we should be most unified as a community doing the same gestures. In receiving the Body of Christ, we become one with Christ and through Christ, one with everyone else who receives the same Eucharistic Lord.

New Life in Christ A Call for All

Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age. (Mt 28:19-20)

By our Baptism, we are called to follow the command that Jesus gave at the end of his earthly journey in human form. Jesus trusts that you and I will continue this ministry of the apostles, and we do so because we are disciples first. We are people who continue to learn and grow in faith.

Update from the Liturgy Commission

The Liturgy Commission (Commission), under the leadership of *Mary Syslo*, met on Thursday March 14 at 7:00 pm to discuss the following.

- A Liturgical Ministers (LM) survey went out to all LMs the first week of March. The main question on the survey was, "Have you ever been distracted by what a Liturgical Minister was wearing during Mass?" Out of 75 responses, 58 LMs (78%) said they have never been distracted. The purpose of this survey was to address the inclusion of a dress code in the future LM Instruction Manual. The Commission will have a subcommittee explore this issue based on the survey results.
- The Eucharistic Minister (EM) subcommittee, lead by **Pat Defiesta.** presented its revision of the EM Instructions to the Commission for concurrence. The next step is to present to the Pastoral Staff for approval and incorporation into the future LM Instruction Manual. There will be an EM Retreat on May 4 to discuss the revised instructions with all EMs.
- The next LM subcommittee to revise its instructions will be the Greeters, which will be lead by Kathy **Kernan**, who was invited to the meeting for an overview of her subcommittee requirements.
- The Commission discussed installing Holy Water bowls by the entrance doors for easier and safer access to the holy water. They were originally considered when the church was built, but the decision was not to include them mainly because of the desire to have one source for the baptismal waters. Also, great care was taken to design the font and the stained glass behind it. So the commission decided against extra Holy Water bowls by the doors.
- The Commission will be hosting the next Welcome Gathering on May 19.

The next Commission meeting will be on April 11 at 7:00 pm.

APRIL Is Child Abuse Prevention Month

Every April, Catholic parishes and schools across the United States participate in National Child Abuse Prevention Month.



The Effects of ABUSE

When a child is abused, the effects are grave and can last a lifetime. Some of the most common effects of abuse include:

- Loss of faith and trust in God.
- Post-traumatic stress disorder, psychological distress, and other indirect signs of trauma, such as anxiety, trouble sleeping, chronic stomach pain, and headaches.
- A greater risk of developing behavioral problems, substance abuse, and suicide.

The sense of violation goes deep into a person's psyche and feelings of anger, shame, hurt, and betrayal can build long after the abuse has taken place.

Steps to Prevent ABUSE

Communicate with Your Children

It is extremely important to communicate openly with your children. Let them know that they can talk to you about anything that bothers them. This will help you identify warning signs and grooming behaviors perpetrated by offenders before they escalate to abuse.

Educate Yourself and Your Children on Abuse

Learning how to identify, prevent, and report abuse is key. Parents and guardians should empower their children to protect themselves from harm and to report abuse. Ask your diocesan safe environment coordinator or parish delegate about opportunities for safe environment training.

Identify and Report Warning Signs of Child Abusers

Grooming behaviors are the actions abusers take to project the image that they are kind, generous, caring people, while their intent is to lure a minor into an inappropriate relationship. Offenders can be patient and may groom their victim, his or her family, or community for years.

Some abusers isolate a potential victim by giving him or her undue attention or lavish gifts, while others allow young people to participate in activities which their parents or guardians would not approve, such as watching pornography, drinking alcohol, using drugs, and excessive touching, such as wrestling and tickling. Abusers also often try to isolate their victims from family or friends and encourage their victims to keep secrets from their parents or other caring adults.

Holding Offenders ACCOUNTABLE

To help hold offenders accountable, report all suspected abuse to local public authorities. You can also contact your local diocesan victim assistance coordinator to make a report and seek outreach for the abused.

In accordance with diocesan policy, when a single act of sexual abuse is admitted or established, the offender is to be removed permanently from ministry.


