WE PROCLAIM CHRIST CRUCIFIED

The symbol of the cross is today associated primarily with Christianity, but variations can be found in ancient religious art. In Christianity, the early Church Fathers began to see the cross foreshadowed in the Old Testament.

In Exodus, God instructs the people to sacrifice a lamb and smear its blood on the doorposts on the night before the exodus. Those who did so became the chosen people of God, taken out of slavery in Egypt. This is seen as a foreshadowing of the blood that Jesus, the Lamb of God, would shed on the cross, and those who believe in Him are God's people, taken out of the slavery of sin. Later, while in the desert, venomous snakes were biting the people, and God instructed Moses to build a bronze serpent on a cross-like post. When the people looked at it, they were healed from the poison. Jesus, on the cross, "becomes sin" to give us life. God uses the universal symbol of a cross to draw us to Himself.

The first Christian communities were less concerned with symbolic representations of Christianity and more focused on preaching and living the Gospel since they were being persecuted. St. Paul, in 1 Corinthians 1:22-23, says, "For Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified." Then, near the end of the letter in chapter 15, he writes, "If Christ has not been raised, then empty is our preaching; empty, too, your faith."

It wasn't until the 4th century, when the Church ceased to be persecuted, that a new artistic culture emerged within Christianity. It began with Emperor Constantine, who embraced Christianity to save the Roman Empire. Before going to war, he had his troops trace giant crosses on their shields. They won the war, Christianity became legal in Rome, and he attributed the victory to the sign of the cross.

Since then, the cross as a Christian symbol has become widespread and used in all forms of artistic expression. Sometime between the 11th and 14th centuries, the tradition of adding the corpus of the crucified Christ to the cross became significant. Echoing St. Paul's words of preaching Christ crucified, the representation of the plain cross was replaced with the crucifix. From this emerged a deep spiritual tradition of meditating on the crucifix as a visible sign of God's love (John 3:16). Artistic emphasis was given to the lifelike representation of Jesus precisely to draw us closer to this mystery. The crucifix is today a key component of our houses of worship. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal requires that a crucifix be present on or near the altar during Catholic Mass.

The original corpus of the processional cross is an important part of the history of St. John the Baptist, created by the same Jewish artist who made the altar and tabernacle. That corpus will be displayed at a location to be determined later.

Let us continue to proclaim Christ crucified in our words, actions, and sacred spaces.

PROCLAMAMOS A CRISTO CRUCIFICADO

El símbolo de la cruz se asocia hoy principalmente con el cristianismo, pero se pueden encontrar variaciones en el arte religioso antiguo. En el cristianismo, los primeros Padres de la Iglesia comenzaron a ver la cruz prefigurada en el Antiguo Testamento.

En Éxodo, Dios ordena al pueblo que sacrifique un cordero y unte su sangre en los postes de las puertas la noche anterior al éxodo. Aquellos que lo hicieran se convertirían en el pueblo elegido de Dios, liberado de la esclavitud en Egipto. Esto se ve como un presagio de la sangre que Jesús, el Cordero de Dios, derramaría en la cruz. Aquellos que creen en Él son el pueblo de Dios, liberado de la esclavitud del pecado. Luego, mientras estaban en el desierto, serpientes venenosas mordían a las personas, y Dios ordenó a Moisés que construyera una serpiente de bronce sobre un poste con forma de cruz, para que cuando la gente la viera, se sanara del veneno. Jesús, en la cruz, "se hace pecado" para dar vida. Dios usa el símbolo universal de una cruz para atraernos hacia Él.

Las primeras comunidades cristianas estaban menos preocupadas por las representaciones simbólicas del cristianismo y más enfocadas en predicar y vivir el Evangelio, ya que estaban siendo perseguidas. San Pablo, en 1 Corintios 1:22-23, dice: "Porque los judíos piden señales y los griegos buscan sabiduría, pero nosotros predicamos a Cristo crucificado". Luego, cerca del final de la carta, en el capítulo 15, escribe: "Si Cristo no resucitó, vana es nuestra predicación, vana también es vuestra fe".

No fue hasta el siglo IV, cuando la Iglesia dejó de ser perseguida, que surgió una nueva cultura artística dentro del cristianismo. Comenzó con el emperador Constantino, quien abrazó el cristianismo para salvar al Imperio Romano. Antes de ir a la guerra, hizo que sus tropas trazaran cruces gigantes en sus escudos. Ganaron la guerra, el cristianismo se volvió legal en Roma y él atribuyó la victoria a la señal de la cruz.

Desde entonces, la cruz como símbolo cristiano se ha extendido y se ha utilizado en todas las formas de expresión artística. En algún momento entre los siglos XI y XIV, el uso de añadir el cuerpo de Cristo crucificado a la cruz se convirtió en una tradición importante. Haciendo eco de las palabras de San Pablo sobre la predicación de Cristo crucificado, las representaciones de la cruz simple fueron reemplazadas por el crucifijo. De ahí surgió una profunda tradición espiritual de meditar sobre el crucifijo como signo visible del amor de Dios (Juan 3:16). Se dio énfasis artístico a la representación realista de Jesús precisamente para acercarnos a ese misterio. El crucifijo es hoy un componente clave de nuestros lugares de culto. La Instrucción General del Misal Romano requiere que haya un crucifijo sobre el altar o cerca de él durante la Misa Católica.

El corpus original de la cruz procesional es una parte importante de la historia de San Juan Bautista, creado por el mismo artista judío que hizo el altar y el tabernáculo. Ese corpus se exhibirá en un lugar que se determinará más adelante. Sigamos proclamando a Cristo crucificado en nuestras palabras, acciones y espacios sagrados.


