## Twelfth Night, Epiphany

For those who thought that Christmas is over, there's still some celebrating left! *Epiphany*, celebrated on January 6, marks the final celebratory day of the Christian holiday season!

The day before the *Feast of the Epiphany* is the twelfth day of Christmas, and its evening is known as "Twelfth Night."

In some Catholic homes, it's not Christmas Day that is for giving presents to children, but the *Feast of Epiphany*, when the gifts are given in a way related to the Magi. Because of the *Epiphany*'s association with the Magis' gift-giving, *Epiphany* is often referred to colloquially as the "Little Christmas."

It is today that the Three Kings should reach the creche (heretofore, they should be kept away from it) and that Baby Jesus should be adorned with signs of royalty, such as a crown, ermine, and gold or purple cloth.

Set up golden candlesticks around the manger where He lies.



## **Hearing Devices Available at Mass**

If you haven't already "heard", we have hearing devices available at all Masses. These devices are designed to work with most hearing aids. If your hearing aids aren't compatible or if you don't have them, we have earphones that work with the devices. The devices are on the video desk in the back of the sanctuary.

Every so often, we hear that both priests are not sounding clear when they speak at the ambo, even for those whose hearing is good. If that has been the case for you, please try using the hearing-assist devices and see if that improves the clarity of the speaker. We are working on constantly improving our video and sound, so please let us know if it makes a difference.

Reach out to a media or point person before Mass for a hearing device. Don't forget to return them after Mass.

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# **Gospel Meditation**

## **Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture**

Have you ever wondered why the magi had gold, frankincense, and myrrh? Matthew's Gospel tells us, "Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh" (Matt. 2:11). Why are these things their "treasures"? One possible answer is they were magicians and astrologers, and these three items were the tools of their questionable trade. In offering them to Christ, they demonstrate that they will cease using such items to predict or control life. They place this baby-king, the God of Israel, at the center of their lives, and not their own devices of control, manipulation and prediction.

Isn't that what we need to do, too? Consider, for example, the magical power of money, symbolized by the magi's gold. Seemingly whatever we ask of money, it does. It wields a god-like power over the world. It can predict the future by guaranteeing better outcomes for us — which is why it is such a tempting alternative to trusting in God. The problem is such absolute trust in money enslaves us to the economic forces that make money so powerful. In paying homage to Jesus with "gold" (i.e., tithing), we participate in his authority over (and therefore freedom from) the magical sway of money.

What things in your life do you use to predict or control your future? What in your life seems to give you power over the world? Those are your treasures. Are you tired of feeling enslaved to them? Find a way to open them and give them to Christ, and you will be freer.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

May the peace of our Lord be with you this Christmas season.

We, the Bishops of Washington State, stand with our brothers and sisters who are immigrants and refugees. The threats of mass deportations and forced separation of families have caused great fear for refugees and migrants and their families—documented and undocumented. These threats are contrary to the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the dignity of every human person that is central to the teachings of our Catholic faith.

In his encyclical letter <u>Fratelli Tutti</u>, Pope Francis reminds us, "If every human being possesses an inalienable dignity, if all people are my brothers and sisters, and if the world truly belongs to everyone, then it matters little whether my neighbor was born in my country or elsewhere" (#55).

While we uphold that we are a nation of laws, as we've stated in the past, we also know that the U.S. immigration system is severely flawed and in need of a comprehensive overhaul. As Christians we know our love for God is measured by our love of neighbor, particularly the most vulnerable. Rooted in Scripture, the Catholic Church has a long tradition of standing with those forced to migrate, "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me" (Mt 25:35). Therefore, we cannot separate our love for God from our love for others, as we echo Pope Francis' call to welcome, protect, promote and integrate immigrants (*Fratelli Tutti* 129).

Even the Statue of Liberty reminds us that migration is part of the fabric of our nation, with a line from Emma Lazarus, a Jewish-American immigrant author, engraved on its pedestal: "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free."

During this time of uncertainty and fear, we stand with our immigrant and refugee brothers and sisters. May all our brothers and sisters on the margins, especially migrants, refugees and asylum seekers, know that our parishes are open for prayer, comfort and solace. May each of us embrace the Gospel teaching and Pope Francis' call to recognize the dignity of others as we welcome the stranger.

As pilgrims of hope entering into a Jubilee year, we journey together through these uncertain times knowing Our Lady of Guadalupe walks with us.

Our Lady of Guadalupe, pray for us!

Queridos hermanos y hermanas en Cristo:

Que la paz de nuestro Señor esté con cada uno de ustedes en este tiempo de Navidad.

Nosotros, los obispos del estado de Washington, estamos con nuestros hermanos y hermanas inmigrantes y refugiados. Las amenazas de deportaciones masivas y separación forzada de familias han causado un gran temor entre refugiados, migrantes y sus familias, tanto documentadas como indocumentadas. Estas amenazas son contrarias al Evangelio de Jesucristo y a la dignidad de cada persona humana que es fundamental para las enseñanzas de nuestra fe católica.

En su carta encíclica <u>Fratelli Tutti</u> el Papa Francisco nos recuerda: "Si toda persona tiene una dignidad inalienable, si todo ser humano es mi hermano o mi hermana, y si en realidad el mundo es de todos, no importa si alguien ha nacido aquí o si vive fuera de los límites del propio país" (#125).

Si bien sostenemos que somos una nación de leyes, como hemos dicho en el pasado, también sabemos que el sistema de inmigración de los EE. UU. tiene graves fallas y necesita una revisión integral. Como cristianos, sabemos que nuestro amor a Dios se mide por nuestro amor al prójimo, particularmente a los más vulnerables. Arraigada en las Escrituras, la Iglesia Católica tiene una larga tradición de apoyar a los que se ven obligados a emigrar: "... porque tuve hambre, y ustedes me dieron de comer; tuve sed, y me dieron de beber; estaba de paso, y me alojaron" (Mt 25:35). Por lo tanto, no podemos separar nuestro amor a Dios y el de los demás, y deseamos hacer eco del llamado del Papa Francisco de acoger, proteger, promover e integrar a los inmigrantes (Fratelli Tutti 129).

Incluso la Estatua de la Libertad nos recuerda que la migración es parte del tejido de nuestra nación, con palabras de Emma Lazarus, una autora inmigrante judía-estadounidense, grabada en su pedestal: "Dame a tus cansados, a tus pobres, a tus masas apiñadas que anhelan respirar libres".

Durante este tiempo de incertidumbre y miedo, apoyamos a nuestros hermanos y hermanas inmigrantes y refugiados. Que todos nuestros hermanos y hermanas en los márgenes, especialmente los migrantes, refugiados y solicitantes de asilo, sepan que nuestras parroquias están abiertas para la oración y el consuelo. Que cada uno de nosotros abrace la enseñanza del Evangelio y el llamado del Papa Francisco a reconocer la dignidad de los demás al dar la bienvenida al extranjero.

Como peregrinos de esperanza que entran en un año jubilar, caminamos juntos a través de estos tiempos inciertos sabiendo que Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe camina con nosotros.
